

# President's Message

At our November meeting, we participated in the Big Squat. Some people did not understand what we were doing. A brief explanation is this – November 19, 2010 was World Toilet Day, an event presented by the World Toilet Organization (<a href="www.worldtoilet.org">www.worldtoilet.org</a>). One of their main goals is to let the world know that more than 2.5 billion people do not have access to proper sanitation. That's a pretty sobering thought that nearly HALF of the world does not have the privilege of



clean running water and flushing toilets, things that we take for granted. And with those conditions, many diseases and other negative social issues result. With the Big Squat, we could have taken the completely serious approach. I opted to make it a little fun as well. And if people took that for a joke, then it is unfortunate that you did not take the time to read about the event and that you did not understand just what we were trying to achieve. To all who participated and who supported our Big Squat, thank you.

You will see a lot of articles in this newsletter about the 2010 ASPE Convention and EPE in Philadelphia. We had a great time and it was a fantastic Convention. The business sessions of the delegate meeting included voting on amendments to ASPE's bylaws. Here are the amendments that passed:

- #3 Student members can now include part-time students and the student membership is limited to a maximum of five (5) years.
- #9 Region Directors and VP Affiliate continuous membership requirements reduced from eight (8) years to four (4) years to match those of other Society Officers.
- #10 Society Officers who hold more than one position (e.g., Secretary and Treasurer) are allowed only a single vote.
- #11 The only Society Officer positions that can be held by the same person are Secretary and Treasurer. [Note that these positions used to be combined as Secretary-Treasurer. At the 2008 Convention, the delegates voted to split the two positions as required by the California corporate code, the state in which ASPE is incorporated.]
- #14 Clarifies how Society Officer vacancies are filled. [This got rid of a redundant method.]
- #16 Redefines the role of ASPE's Executive Director, now ASPE's CEO and principal officer.
- #18 Redefines how regions can petition for the recall of Region Directors.





I am honored to be entrusted with this responsibility. It is a great conduit to delve deeper into our organization and to represent OUR members of OUR Chapter, but also to discuss and vote on things that affect ALL of the Members of ALL of the Chapters. The process builds relationships not only with the people but with the organization itself as if it were a living entity. I guess that it actually is "living", in some ways, as we help to nurture it and to guide it while it grows.

I am also honored and humbled to report that I was elected as the new Vice President Legislative for the Society. Thanks to all of you for your support, especially the delegates from Chicago, and the other Chapters that voted for me. I am committed to serving you beyond your expectations. I feel that I learned a lot from this Convention, some of which is less tangible than direct technical information from the seminars. I learned something about "heart" from Vince Papale. I did not expect to get this much out of our keynote speaker. He's a great guy to hang with. Check out the movie about his struggle: "The Invincible".

On the technical side, I think maybe the biggest thing that I learned about was the current research that we are doing with the RF concerning roof drains. There were 3,000 roof failures last year! As we know, the current roof drain standards address only the sizing of the systems and not the drain performance. What we have found is that although the piping is sized correctly, we can observe pressures within the system that may exceed the design limits of the piping, fitting, and restraints, leaving them vulnerable to catastrophic failure of the systems. The reports will be made available when they are complete. Watch for them.

#### ANOTHER GRAND CONVENTION

The Society's 22<sup>nd</sup> Convention and Engineered Plumbing Exposition (my 15<sup>th</sup>) in Philadelphia went well. The Convention hotel and adjacent convention center were excellent venues.

The Delegate business sessions took their usual long time with bylaw revisions which didn't result in many changes. Most important, our Tim Smith was elected Vice President Technical and David DeBord was elected Vice President Legislative. Also, Joe Ficek received an Award of Merit for his work on the CPD program and Dan Fagan received a Certificate of Appreciation for his work in webinar presentations.
